Minutes of the Regular Meeting of the Board of Directors January 21, 2021 4:00 pm - 6:00 pm via Zoom teleconference

1. Call to Order

Kossy called the meeting to order at 4:03 p.m.

2. Approval of Agenda

Glauthier moved to approve the agenda, Etherton seconded. Motion passed unanimously.

3. Introductions of Guests and Staff

All in attendance introduced themselves.

4. Public Comment

There was no public comment.

5. Consent Agenda

Glauthier moved to approve the consent agenda, as amended, Etherton seconded. Motion passed unanimously.

6. Regular Agenda

- 6.1 Presentation by Doug Silverstein (Circular SMC Co-Founder)- "Circular SMC: a community alliance to reduce single use plastic." (see attached)
 - There was discussion about Circular SMC's approach and the true cost of plastic.
- 6.2 Presentation by Jarrad Fisher (San Mateo RCD Program Manager)- "Water for Farms, Fish and People: an innovative program to protect water resources." (see attached)
 - There was discussion about program metrics, communicating results to the community, consideration of greenhouse gas benefits, and staff contributions.
- 6.3 Board will discuss and consider possible action regarding LAFCo adoption of Sphere of Influence.

- There was discussion about the LAFCo hearing on January 20, 2020 considering the RCD's Sphere of Influence, potential new boundaries and next steps, and formation of an ad hoc committee to consider the issue, next steps, and fiscal implications and to engage with community leaders who may want to help.
- ACTION: Glauthier moved to establish an ad hoc committee, comprised of himself
 and Kossy, to work with Nelson to explore how to move forward. Etherton seconded.
 Motion passed unanimously.
- 6.4 Board will consider allocation of 7% of 2020 earrings for eligible employees to the Employer Sponsored 401K Plan.
 - **ACTION**: Glauthier moved to allocate 7% of 2020 earnings for eligible employees to the Employer Sponsored 401K Plan, Etherton seconded. Motion passed unanimously.
- 6.5 Board will consider contracting with Tukeman Geospatial for mapping and GIS analysis services to produce a suite of deliverables related to wildfire risk mapping as a part of the Santa Cruz Mountains Stewardship Network's (SCMSN) Landscape Database and Vegetation Mapping Project in Santa Cruz and San Mateo Counties.
 - There was discussion about the work to be done, the expertise of Tukeman Geospatial, the importance of the project, and the RCD's fiscal sponsorship role.
 - **ACTION:** Etherton moved to contract with Tukeman Geospatial for mapping and GIS analysis services as part of the SCMSN Landscape Database and Vegetation Mapping Project in Santa Cruz and San Mateo Counties, Glauthier seconded. Motion passed unanimously.
- 6.6 Board will consider contracting with Storesund Consulting for the Butano Creek Streamflow Improvement Project.
 - ACTION: Glauthier moved to contract with Storesund Consulting for the Butano Creek Streamflow Improvement Project, Etherton seconded. Motion passed unanimously.
- 6.7 Board will consider Resolution 2021-1: Approval to Submit Proposal for Funding to National Association of Conservation Districts' Urban Agriculture Conservation Initiative Program.
 - There was discussion about what the grant would accomplish, how it would build on previous work and focus on soil health, soil contaminant testing, social justice, promoting the program, and anticipated program demand.
 - **ACTION:** Etherton moved to approve Resolution 2021-1, Glauthier seconded. Motion passed unanimously.

6.10 Directors' reports

- Watt expressed his enthusiasm for Governor Newsom's Executive Order and hoped it would help people see the importance for baseline funding for organizations, like the RCD, that are essential to manage land.

 - He expressed his desire to see a First Rains presentation; Nelson noted that would be happening at the February Board Meeting.
 - He was pleased with the California Association of RCD's annual report and their continued professionalism.
- Kossy had attended a Weed Management Area meeting and reported that they are looking for a rangeland manager to join the committee; Watt said he would give it some thought and asked if certification was a requirement. Kossy said it was not.



Water for Farms, Fish and People

- Use **less water** through improved efficiency.
- Minimize impacts of water diversions by changing timing and rate of diversions.
- Improve water security for farms, fish and people through above actions, increasing water storage capacity and working to institute forbearance agreements with water users.







 Help farmers and domestic water users conserve, strategically manage, and store water.

Identify needs of landowners and watersheds

Assess and address infrastructure

• Improve water pumping, delivery and storage facilities.

 Coordinate water users to balance demands on limited resources.

 Restore water to creeks for threatened and endangered species.
